'The Map' part 2: Developing non-practice training routines



Every player can benefit from developing their own set of routines and processes to

help them prepare and play successfully.

In the first instalment of this series, I dealt with developing routines to be employed during batting, bowling and fielding practice.

This article will deal with developing sound routines to help you get the most out of your training sessions away from the team: Non-practice training.

For some players this may be a long jog with the dog every other evening. For others it may involve gym sessions, road running, yoga lessons and a whole range of 'cross training' options. While it is great to devote time away from 'just batting and bowling practice', a haphazard approach can be detrimental, causing fatigue and lack of clear focus on the ultimate goal of improving your cricket.

How do you go about this training more systematically?

Adding value to cricket practice

As with the whole mapping process, the younger cricketer will not need a very detailed or complicated set of routines. They are supposed to make your job of preparing to play cricket easier.

More experienced players, playing at higher levels (or aspiring to reach higher levels) need to spend considerable amounts of time each week 'adding value' to the work they do at cricket practice. When deciding on your specific non-practice training routines it may be useful to follow a few rules.

- **Examine your game and identify what physical and psychological aspects need attention**
- **Identify what action or activity will provide the required attention**
- **Identify how much time you have available to devote to an activity – if there are a number of activities you may also have to prioritise each activity to create the best overall fit.**
- **Try not to choose activities that require a hard and fast commitment. This will allow you the flexibility to miss the occasional session when it is at cross purposes with your specific preparation for cricket.**
- **Monitor your energy levels. Don't over commit yourself to too many training activities. This may cause fatigue and physical injury or just a reduction in your enthusiasm for cricket training. You don't want to burn out!**
- **Where possible, seek out experts to help you perform your identified activities properly. E.g. sprints coaches, psychologists, yoga teachers**
- **Evaluate your sessions constantly. While it may take a while for an activity to start having an impact on your cricket, don't persevere with an activity that has not, over time, shown any beneficial results. Devote your time to activities that really do help your play better cricket**

To clarify this further, let's look at some practical examples..

Example 1: The younger player

A young player may decide the one area they really need to improve is in their flexibility.

They are getting lots of strains and aches and pains after training and this is affecting their performance on weekends. A non-practice training routine for a young player

focusing on improving their flexibility may be a simple [morning and evening stretching regime](#) (15 minutes of static stretches before breakfast and again before bed each day).

Example 2: The aspiring professional

As the player gets older, they may decide that improved flexibility has a very positive impact on their performance in games. This player may then decide to take some yoga lessons if they have the free time to do so.

They may also be going to a sprints coach one night a week to improve their running style (so important for bowlers of all types as well as fielders and runners between the wickets!); playing in a touch football competition (to improve their agility); and going to the gym twice a week (to improve their strength and muscular endurance).

For this player, organizing all of these activities into a routine is extremely important. If he is not organized, he will miss sessions, get over tired and end up falling well short of what he wanted to achieve by taking on so many activities – cricketing success.

The key to deciding what should be included in your non-practice training routine is the amount of time you have available to train and one other very important consideration: balance.

Always strive for Balance

It is genuinely unhealthy and ultimately unproductive to devote all your time to a single pursuit such as cricket. One must have other things going on in one's life to enjoy the whole human experience.

Non-practice training activities can provide some of this balance. Allowing you mix with 'non-cricketers' and spend time enjoying yourself away from the game. (Matthew Hayden identified this as being a major reason why he was able to play the game at the highest level for so long.)

So now we have discussed developing routines for cricket training as well as training routines conducted away from cricket. Hopefully *your* map is starting to take shape!

Every journey is an adventure, and every map provides an invitation to explore the world ... and yourself!

Cricket tour to Port Elizabeth

Not even technical problems with the bus and an early start could hide the palpable excitement on the bus as we prepared to embark on a whistle-stop tour of Port Elizabeth. Twelve gruelling hours later, with the under 14's having talked non-stop the entire way, we disembarked straight off the bus into St George's Park to watch a 20/20 game.

Saturday saw us take on Grey and it seemed that the long trip had taken its toll on the junior sides with both the under 14's and under 15's losing. The senior sides fared better with the second side enjoying a winning draw against their counterparts after scoring an impressive 246, Grey were never really in the running ending about 60 runs short with 8 wickets having been captured. The first X1 was involved in a thrilling match which ebbed and flowed and eventually came down to the final delivery of the day with the hosts needing 6 to win of the last ball with the Bosch boys needing just one wicket to secure victory. A forward defence ensured that the match ended in a draw.

Day two was the turn of Woodridge to host us and three of the four games saw Rondebosch bat first and score large totals. Both the under 14's and the seconds got well in excess of 300 and the first team scored

253-5, declaring before their 65 overs due to a very slow over rate from the hosts. In both the under 14 game and the 1st X1 game, Rondebosch narrowly failed to win having Woodridge 9 wickets down and them being well short of the required target. The seconds secured an easy victory bowling Woodridge out cheaply and the under 15's, having bowled Woodridge out for just over a hundred, chased the total down with relative ease after a shaky start.

After a quick shower and some supper, we greeted our hosts and returned to the buses for the return trip – the under 14's still having the energy to talk all the way to Mossel Bay! Tired, but happy after a long three days, we arrived back after an uneventful trip, hopefully having learnt a little bit about ourselves, our teammates and the great game of cricket.

I would like to thank the school for affording us the opportunity to tour (and the teachers who had to look after our classes) and the parents who offered so much support - both those on the tour and those who were constantly being updated at home – your support for your sons is invaluable! Lastly I would like to thank Ryan, Mr Nel, Mr Snijman, Mr Friedenthal and Mr Fransman for giving up their time to make the tour such a success.

The first X1 failed to capitalise on another solid start, (Aidan Morris 36, Matthew Brache 24) again failing to come to terms with spinners bowling from both ends - in a 22 over period we lost 5 wickets whilst only managing to score 34 runs. The innings was rescued by some positive batting from Hilio de Abreu (25) and Richard Steinhaus (38 not out) who shared a 51 run partnership of just 37 balls, which took our score to 181 for 8 after 65 overs. Our running between wickets was disappointing and 210 would have been achieved if we had simply run well.

This shortcoming was accentuated by the fact that the Grey batsmen took every opportunity available to them and this resulted in Grey making good progress in achieving the score. Shortly after tea, Grey was 146 for 4 and with 16 overs remaining and only 36 runs required, it looked as if the match was lost. Scott van Breda then produced an inspired spell of bowling (to finish with match figures of 4-37 off 19) and was well supported by Michael Rippon and some terrific fielding, Bosch began to exert pressure on the hosts.

A dramatic finish culminated in Grey needing 6 to win off the last ball and us needing only one wicket, Gavin Roos (ex Bosch) managed to defend the last ball to result in a draw that will be fondly remembered for the fighting spirit of the side by all those Bosch supporters who witnessed the game.
